## **LRGC Indoor Range Rules - Shooter's Agreement**

All persons with the intent to utilize the LRGC indoor range must read, understand, and agree to abide by the rules outlined below. Please read and initial next to the circle at end of each numbered point to indicate that you have read and understood each item, and then request clarification of any points not fully understood.

Please sign and date the document to indicate that you fully understand and agree to abide by these rules.

GENERAL (Initial next to circle if understood)			
1. A LRGC Board of Directors certified Range Officer (RO) will be present to assist you, give range commands and end that safe shooting practices are being employed. Shooters are to listen (i.e. not talk) and obey all range rules and commands from the Range Officer. Failure to do so can result in temporary and/or full loss of shooting privileges. O_	nsure		
2. <b>SAFETY IS PARAMOUNT!</b> It is the responsibility of ALL shooters to conduct themselves in a manner to maintain a shooting environment for everyone, and to notify the Range Officer should an unsafe practice or be observed or condition potentially exist. If doubt or concern exists – it is your responsibility to ASK/NOTIFY the Range Officer! O_	safe		
3. The LRGC Indoor range is a provincially approved range for the discharge of low-energy firearms for target shooting from a stationary shooting position ONLY. Therefore: 1) the use of a holster on the firing line is not permitted, and 2) high-energy and/or magnum rounds may not be used. Prohibited rounds include:	ıg		
General: ALL containing tracer bullets, metal piercing bullets, shot-type projectiles or containing steel in projectile.  Rifle: ALL centerfire rifle, rimfire: .22 magnum, .17 Mach 2, 17 HMR  Handgun: ALL larger than .45 cal, ALL magnum rounds (e.g357 cal magnum and .44 cal magnum, etc.) or rounds verequivalent muzzle energy (> approx. 450 ft-lbs of energy) such as .357 SIG and 7.62 Tokarev. (See posted list.)	vith		
Note: Hand loads can be deceiving. Noise level and backstop ring quickly indicate rounds which are loaded too powe for our range. Where a concern is identified, the Range Officer will disallow the use of any questionable load until app by LRGC to ensure safety, compliance with provincial regulations, and to avoid potential damage to the range backstop. If in doubt - please consult a Range Officer.			
4. Range openings are scheduled and generally restricted for the shooting of specific firearm types. Use of firearms other than those designated will not be allowed – see posted schedule and plan appropriately.  O_			
5. All persons inside the range must use proper ear protection and eye protection when the range is active.			
6. Alcohol impairs judgment and has no place in combination with a firearm. Club rules clearly state that anyone who has been drinking or doing drugs may not shoot and therefore should not enter the range. Anyone suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol will be asked to leave the range.  O_			
ARRIVING AT THE RANGE			
7. Shooters are required to sign in, indicate the range position they will shoot from, and pay the prescribed fees for themselves and any guests (see posted fees). Prepaid shoot cards may be used for payment. No "human-form" targets are allowed.			
8. Shooters must provide their firearms license and/or Authorization to Transport (ATT) upon request. O_			
9. New shooters must identify themselves to the Range Officer upon arrival. Any shooters with guests, or unaccompanied non-member guests must also contact the Range Officer upon arrival.  O_			
10. The Range Officer must approve all shooters to shoot without direct supervision. New members will be required to provide a summary of their firearm handling and shooting experience and may be scrutinized regarding firearm and ammo type, safe firearm handling skills, knowledge of proper range procedures, and shooting skill. The Range Officer			
must be satisfied that the individual is capable of discharging the firearm safely and within the rules of range.  O_			
11.No smoking, or eating is allowed within the shooting range area. Drinks and cell phones are permitted, but they and other distractions are not allowed on the firing line (i.e. only allowed behind the red line on the floor).			
RANGE COMMANDS – APPROACHING THE FIRING & TARGET LINES			
12. The Range Officer will provide verbal range commands to provide safe operation of the range using the terminology listed below. At all times the operational status of the range will be indicated by lights (operated by the Range Officer) as follows: (Please do not talk while these commands are being given!)			
Off: INACTIVE – range not in operation - firearms to remain cased. No restriction to movement within the range area.	<u>-</u>		
Red: ACTIVE – shooters on the firing line handling firearms – potentially loaded (note: firearms may only be loaded once commanded by the range officer). Eye and ear protection must be used while active. No persons allowed down-range.			
<b>Green: SAFE</b> – all shooters are behind the firing line. All firearms on the firing line are verified safe by the Range Offic (i.e. cased, or open, unloaded, and pointed down-range. No pre-loaded magazines present.) No persons allowed to approach the shooting benches or handle firearms.	er		
13. No persons are allowed to go down-range until authorized by the Range Officer and the <b>green</b> light is ON.  Travel to the target area will proceed as directed by the Range Officer.  O_			
14. When the line is ACTIVE (red light on), shooters should approach and uncase their firearms only at the firing line. Multiple firearms, using different but near similar sized cartridges, are not allowed on the bench as this creates an unsafe condition. When not being handled, the firearm should be unloaded, open and pointed down-range.
